Farmer Owner.

Dave Ogden calls himself the second-and-a-half generation farmer on a farm near Wood River, NE. His grandfather moved to the farm in the middle of his milkman career. took the risk, and made a successful go at it. When Dave first started farming, he bought his farm in 1983 with 18% interest. His father, a lifelong mentor of Dave's, helped him focus on keeping the money out of the banker's hands, and Dave says it was the best decision he ever made. His father always said, "Time is the most valuable commodity," and Dave lives by that statement. Now, 100% of his farm is irrigated corn that is turned into ethanol. Married, with five children, one grandchild and another on the way. Dave is the embodiment of a family farmer. When he can spend a day or two away from farming, Dave gets out and golfs, pheasant hunts and snowmobiles, and if he didn't, he'd be farming every day. His motivation is his family, and now with his son coming back to the farm after school, Dave is thrilled that his farm is in the hands of people he trusts: his family and Aurora Coop.

Dave relies on Aurora Coop and their teamwork to accomplish every goal he sets for his farm. Technological advances, seed choices and every other decision would not have the same value and impact as it does with the advice and collaboration with Aurora Coop.

Owners Acres.

Owner Acres allows us to perform research on a bigger scale, with the focus being on management systems and treatment timings. We work closely with Real Farm Research to find new solutions that will bring value and yield to our owner's farms. We are able to dive deep into new technologies and look at different cropping systems. Throughout our growing season, we invite our owners to experience our farms through various tour events. With the constraints of 2020, smaller groups and one-on-one tours were offered. Since its inception, Owners Acres has grown to include:

- 65 acres in Aurora, NE
- 200 acres in Hastings, NE both irrigated & dryland
- 24 dryland acres in David City, NE
- 33 acres in Central City, NE

Quality Proven.

Brandon Hamer is the Director of Precision Crop Management for Aurora Coop. Their team is responsible for the 325 acres of Owners Acres across four locations in Central Nebraska. The Precision Crop Management team interacts with employees and growers regarding new technologies in planting and application while looking at innovative farm management practices. While the normal large group tours had to be cut down to follow COVID guidelines, Hamer appreciated the opportunity presented by small group and one-on-one tours. 2020 saw record yield results in several trials including raising 344 bushel corn and 100.6 bushel soybeans at Owners Acres. "We had a wind event that took out some of our trial results, but we collected data on the majority of our trials and overall, it was a favorable growing season. Owners Acres was able to accomplish these feats through implementing management practices that have continually improved our farms. Our team wakes up in the morning

focused on helping our owners produce more bushels in an efficient manner, and we are able to demonstrate many of those practices at Owners Acres. We are also able to try new ideas out and show them to growers prior to them having to make the investment themselves. Not only do we enjoy what we do at Owners Acres, but we enjoy walking our growers' fields as well, learning from them and following up on changes that they make. Tougher together starts with a relationship where we are both working together, hand in hand, from Owner Acres tour events all the way to meeting with farmers in their shops or dining room tables throughout the winter months."





Working As **Family.**

Jason Throener is the VP of Sales and Operations for our Agronomy team. With 16 years of experience at Aurora Coop, Jason has held multiple positions including Location Manager, Business Unit Manager and Director of Procurement. His years of experience have brought him to overseeing all agronomy sales and operations. Jason believes that no matter what happens, pandemics or even year-to-year weather challenges, tougher together means doing what is necessary to get the job done. That starts with the unique personal connections and relationships we strive to have with our farmer-owners. In 2020, our team was resilient in keeping safety and health top of mind for our growers and ourselves as we never stopped servicing acres. "We learned how important our faith, family and friends were through the challenges of 2020. My time here has taught me this is more than just a place to work. It's a family both with the employees and our farmers. Strong family farms supporting their cooperative circle back into building strong rural communities."



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The Show Must Go On.

Service is what sets Aurora Cooperative apart from everyone else. Regardless of it being at the height of quarantine, near perfect weather conditions set the stage for our farmers to get their crop planted in 10 days. Hitting this window with service that doesn't stop until the job is finished is what makes us tougher together. But to be tough, you have to prepare. Our competitive edge is logistical management. Just because our locations limited interactions, it didn't keep our products from getting to your farm. We used the opportunity to serve you where you needed us. We learned that where we work doesn't constrain us from what we do for your operation.

Our Research, Healthy Farming

Director of Real Farm Research, Chad Hill, oversees the verification of seed performance and product value with small plot research through the hills and plains of the Midwest. "Everything we do is for the farmers. All of our workers are willing to get their boots dirty and work to ensure we provide value in everything we do and help make the best decisions while being there to help farmers with their operations. Through the pandemic, we are truly there with the farmers through the thick and thin. We are still out there validating products showing their value."

Real Farm Research

Real Farm Research works with Prairie Valley and A-Brand seed to conduct small plot research for both corn hybrid and soybean variety trials, along with trialing of our R2G product line-up. With 21 locations in five states including Kansas, Iowa, South Dakota, Colorado and Nebraska, Real Farm Research tests in many different environments, which increases confidence of yield performance and seed value.



At Aurora Cooperative, we understand how important seed placement is for your farm. We provide local agronomy teams who visit your farm locations and test seeds in local plots to provide and ensure verification of seed quality and production. We create the opportunity for farmers to observe the quality of our seeds for the investments of their farm.

Prairie Valley, a historical seed brand founded 70 years ago, was revived using our historical research and data from our owner's farms. Farmers get a firsthand experience to see how the seed grows in their local community with an eight-county seed zone test. The Prairie Valley seed has premier traits and genetics, engineered with our elite germplasm, making it the perfect seed for your farm.

The Importance of Local.

Prairie Valley prides themselves on local seed testing to provide the best possible seed for the diverse eco-regions of the High Plains. Prairie Valley conducts small plot seed testing in local areas to not only see which seeds work best where, but which seeds have superior yield and profitability. Brad Moody is the Director of Genetics for Prairie Valley and A-Brand. "Farmers aren't really interested in corn that performs in Indiana or other areas in the country. Our local mission means that we are testing local. With drastic changes in altitude, irrigation and soil differences, farmers can observe our local testing and see for themselves the value of the product before purchasing it for their farm. The better the products we make at Prairie Valley with our incredible

germplasms, plot testing and research, the more options and diversities we can produce, and farmers are able to be more profitable, and ultimately have a healthier farm."

Rewarding Work.

Tyler Kester's story is that of a small town Nebraskan: graduating college, trying out other states and ending up back in the good life. Kester, VP of Grain and Animal Nutrition, joined Aurora Coop in 2014 in marketing and merchandising, trading grain, shuttles and trucks. Within seven years, Kester's department increased from two employees to eight, tripling the amount of grain handled. The success of his department is simply the result of hard, honest teamwork. Kester's passion is developing people and building teams. He is able to see that rewarding process every day here at Aurora Coop. "Our employees have a work hard, play hard mentality. We have a selfless group of people who work together as a family. Our employees understand their accountability at work and at home and we're always pushing each other to be the best we can be. The whole company is cyclical like this. We work hard to make farmers successful and the hard work of our farmers is the reason we are successful. When our owners are successful, our employees will see success and ultimately we have a successful company."





A Positive Year.

Apart from the pandemic, our 2020 grain operations saw a record-setting year. Owners Acres set yield records for their research and we gained an ethanol plant to the west of Aurora. Alongside gaining the ethanol plant that will consume 35-40 million bushels of corn annually, we had a fast and hard successful harvest and moved our grain across the country and out of the continent in a time when many companies had to temporarily shut their doors or close permanently.

Harvest Records Set in 2020.

Aurora West: Hit a new record of 559,000 bushels of corn taken out in a single day, beating the old record of 100,000 bushels.

Superior East: October 12th and 13th 2020 2nd and 3rd largest corn harvest days on record, respectively.

Republic: October 12th, 13th and 14th, largest corn harvest days on record.

Sedan: New record of 412,000 bushels of corn taken in a single day.



Show Your Skills.

We adapted this year and made sure our producers had the products and feed they needed to take care of their cows, swine, and sheep through the pandemic. Livestock didn't stop eating or needing care regardless of the massive changes throughout the world. Nothing was going to stop our youth from showing their livestock in local county fairs and livestock shows, even if it did look a little different than normal. Our A-Show Feed rewards program had its second year of success in the ring rewarding 4-H and FFA and county fairs, the Junior National Show and the Carcass Contest & Rate of Grain show.

Safety First.

Here at Aurora Coop, we had a choice to make when the pandemic hit. This posed a problem and we decided to lean into the challenge. "Without our farmers, we are nothing. The relationship between Aurora Cooperative and the farmers means everything to the company. The Safety and Risk Management team works with every employee in the company. When the chips are down and catastrophe strikes, the Safety and Risk Management team shines. Being 100% injury free was definitely the goal at the beginning of the year. All operations changed due to the pandemic. Our employees did a fantastic job in accommodating the changes. We decreased the frequency of Gl/Auto/Property claims by 23% and the cost of misapplication claims decreased by 82%. Total severity actually decreased by 58% between the two policy years. Tougher together means getting the job done, together, no matter what. In the end, we pulled ourselves up by our bootstraps and got it done."

Forwarding a Clean Future.

Sometimes the story of an Aurora Coop employee doesn't start with them, but before, with family connections. For Bill Gowen, VP of Energy, his connection to Aurora Coop started with his dad, who was the feed division manager in Aurora. "My dad always said I could buy anything I wanted as long as I found a way to pay for it." With that advice in 1976, Bill got a job on the weekends and summers during high school at the Aurora station, pumping gas and fixing tires. In 1979, he came on full-time driving a propane truck and a few years later moved

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on to his real love - working on vehicles in the shop. Eventually, the station expanded into a service center and Bill has 42 years of service under his belt. Bill stated his purpose at Aurora succinctly: "It's simple. Teamwork. We are tougher when we work together and find solutions for our customers and other divisions. We take whatever comes in front of us, and find a way. Our relationships with farmers are as important as finding solutions for them. Our relationship lets us focus individually on those farmers to encompass all their needs."



Clean Fuel Is Now

Fuel the Cure is a Nebraska awareness promotion bringing attention to the benefits of cleaner-burning American Ethanol blends available throughout the state. For every gallon of ethanol-blended fuel – E15 to flex fuel E85 – purchased between October 1st-31st, 2020, the participating fuel station donated three cents per gallon with proceeds benefiting the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center. Aurora Cooperative donated \$2,279 this year!



Growing Our Family.

2020 saw many things, but with all challenges there is growth. During the height of quarantine, Aurora Coop, formerly partnering with Pacific Ethanol, Inc purchased the ethanol plant west of Aurora, NE giving them full ownership and brought the employees into the Aurora Coop family. For Adam Neville, the plant manager, tougher together is more than just words. "We had to shut the plant down about three weeks into March 2020 until early June. The plant is not a place you can work from home, so we followed procedures, limited people in high traffic areas, and kept people out who didn't need to be there for work. Then, the change in ownership was amazing. The Coop is very committed to this facility and the employee group working here, and wants to see this investment run for a long time." The transition from Pacific Ethanol to Aurora Coop was made with ease. A facility employee since 2014, Adam said the transition into Aurora Coop was mostly on the IT side of operations, and only after going through the transition did he understand what it meant to truly be tougher together.

An "island" before being bought, Adam now has access to the Aurora Coop community and experienced workers for everyday or emergency needs and returns the favor as often as he can. "This plant doesn't shut down for anything. It's a 24/7 operation and doesn't care what holiday or whose birthday it is. When something happens, we need to fix it. Now Aurora Coop works together always to help us succeed."






Growing Our Operation.

This year, we purchased the remaining 74% of Pacific Aurora, LLC from Pacific Ethanol, making Aurora Coop 100% owner. Today it is renamed Aurora Cooperative Ethanol, LLC. Included in the purchase are:

- 2 Ethanol Plants 145 M annual production
- Grain Facility 4.1M bushel capacity
- Integrated rail facilities

This purchase was key to the expansion and collaboration of Aurora Coop and neighboring communities so that we can all continue to achieve success, especially in trying times.


